Before joining Berkeley's faculty, Silverstein held faculty positions in political science, law, and administrative science at Rice University, Dartmouth College, the University of Minnesota, and Lewis & Clark College. In addition, he served as a program director for the nonprofit, nonpartisan New America Foundation in Washington, D.C. The author of *Imbalance of Powers: Constitutional Interpretation and the Making of American Foreign Policy* (1997), he is working on a new book titled *How Law Kills Politics*. Following his undergraduate education at Cornell University, where he served as editor-in-chief of the *Cornell Daily Sun*, Silverstein worked as a journalist for the *Wall Street Journal* in New York and Hong Kong and the *San Francisco Chronicle* before receiving a PhD from Harvard University.
